to public education.

ADVOCATING FOR THE ONE

When you know a child is struggling and you are not sure what they are struggling with or how to help them, it can be daunting. This class

will let you know what options are available and how to advocate for that child. From learning disabilities to mental health challenges there are resources for every child to reach their potential.

Mindi Barker has been serving in PTA for 20 years and has been on the Utah PTA Board of Directors five of those vears. She first learned about advocating for the one when one of her six children was developmentally delayed and she did not know what to do to help him. Finding the right resources made all the difference in his life. She has since found out that three of her children are autistic, two have diagnosed OCD, and many of them have struggled with anxiety and depression. Help is out there and Mindi wants to show others where to find it.

Karen Conder is the Utah PTA Special Needs Specialist and also a member of the National PTA Resolutions Committee. She is a former elementary school teacher and the mother of 2 adult children with disabilities.

David Bowman




Join David as he shares his unique insights as the "technology parent of 57,000 students" and

Mandy Anderson is currently serving as the reigning Mrs. USA, is a mother of 8. home schools her children, is a Refugee Advocate, Inspirational Speaker, the CEO of her new non profit, Mama Sarah, which seeks to support local refugees with ongoing consumable needs as well as the establishment of 2 small orphan home in Africa. She just returned from New York Fashion Week where she walked For Runway to Relief for Refugees, Orphans and Advocacy. She also uses her voice to spread for Suicide Awareness as she shares her own experiences and struggles with mental health.

Toni Brown is the Jordan School
District Community and Outreach
Specialist. She taught students from
all over the world developing a love
for the unique experience of refugee
and newcomer families. Today she is
the coordinator of a new team of
refugee mentors addressing the needs
of a rapidly growing refugee

population. Together they bridge the gap between home and school to help students feel welcomed as they acclimatize to their new home.

Jamie Ellis is the current Director of Student Educational Access & Opportunity department in Weber School District. She has served in this role as well as former equity and diversity roles in Weber School District. Through her department she serves students and families who qualify for Federal Programs, specifically Title III and Title VI. She and her team provide translation and interpretation services for the district through their Language Services department. She works closely with the Weber School District Foundation to support after school programming and teen centers in our secondary schools. She is a former board member for Boys and Girls Club of Weber/Davis.



CONFERENCE RULES

IN-PERSON AND VIRTUAL ATTENDEES



- All voting delegates MUST have their membership registered on the membership list of their local PTA/ PTSA and on the books of the Treasurer of Utah PTA fourteen (14) days preceding the annual conference (Utah PTA Bylaws). All delegates are verified by Utah PTA prior to the Conference.
- 2. Non-voting delegates may attend all meetings of the conference, provided they register and pay a fee.
- A badge shall be provided for in-person entrance to meetings. Badges will be required for inperson admission to all portions of the conference.
- 4. Workshop presenters and guests shall be provided with identification badges entitling them to admission.
- During the general sessions, non-voting attendees will be observers only as per Utah PTA Bylaws. (ARTICLE XXII:Section 7)
- In-person delegates are requested to be seated before the opening of each session.

- No message is to be presented directly to the chair (the president). All messages and announcements must be given to a designated person at the floor microphone or through the virtual chat.
- 8. Any person disrupting the business of the conference shall be asked to leave the meeting or be removed from the webinar.
- The minutes of the conference shall be approved by a committee appointed by the president.
- 10. Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the conference in all cases not provided for in Utah PTA Bylaws or these Conference Rules.

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SPEAKING AND VOTING PROCEDURES

- Voting delegates must be present in person or virtually to vote.
- Delegates must be a member of a Utah PTA unit to make motions, debate, and vote.
- 3. No delegate may represent more than one PTA unit when voting.
- 4. Only voting delegates may comment or vote on a question.
- In-person delegates must come to the microphone on the floor and be acknowledged by the chair before speaking and writing their name, the name of the unit represented, and the unit location.
- During the business portion of the meeting the Zoom Chat feature shall be reserved for virtual delegates who wish to speak to the business.
- 7. Virtual delegates shall raise their hand using the Zoom raise hand feature and type their name, the name of the unit represented, the unit location, and their purpose for commenting (for, against, or question) in the Zoom Chat. Comments from virtual attendees will be taken in the order received through chat.
- 8. The designated person at the table will read any business received in the Zoom Chat once acknowledged by the chair.
- Once acknowledged by the chair, the virtual attendee will be unmuted and allowed to speak.
- 10. Comments from all delegates are

- limited to two minutes at a time on any question and only twice on the same question. No delegate may comment a second time until all delegates seeking recognition have had an opportunity to speak.
- 11. To make a second comment, delegates must follow the same process to be acknowledged and given the ability to comment again. Delegates must observe the timer on the screen.
- 12. No business shall be on the floor more than 10 minutes unless debate time is extended. To extend debate time, the motion to extend debate must be adopted by a two-thirds vote. Inquiry motions or points of order do not count in the 10 minutes.
- The chair shall recognize delegates for and against a motion in alternating order.
- 14. To stop debate and force the vote, a member should obtain the floor and say, "I call the previous question." This requires a second and a two-thirds vote.
- 15. If discussion is needed, the question on a motion should not be called until there has been a reasonable amount of discussion on both sides of the issue, at least two "FOR" and two "AGAINST".
- 16. A tie vote is a lost vote.
- 17. Hasty action may be corrected by use of the motion to reconsider. The motion may be made only by one who voted on the prevailing side.

THE UTAH PTA 2024-25 LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES



EDUCATION. Support an adequately funded public school system by funding a 3% Weighted Pupil Unit (WPU) increase over and above growth and inflation; implement policies to increase proficiency levels by improving attendance, reducing class sizes, and supporting teachers; increase academic excellence for all Utah students; and prioritize local control to Local Education Agencies (LEAs) and individual schools.

HEALTH: Support legislative action that focuses on the diverse mental health needs of Utah's students and families, with a focus on promoting protective factors. This includes increasing public knowledge and understanding of mental health concerns throughout the state, access to resources, as well as providing funding for proactive prevention, timely interventions, and community-based initiatives utilizing evidence-based methods.

SAFETY: Support funding to strengthen school safety and security measures, to ensure a physical, academic, social, and emotional safe school community for all This includes but is not limited to school infrastructure, comprehensive safety training, community violence and bullying intervention and reduction, mental health training and resources as well as the education to families and communities on school safety protocols, children's online security, and the assessment of digital threats posed to schools across Utah.

FAMILY ENGAGEMENT: Support legislation, funding, and community partnerships that provide programs and resources to strengthen families and children's social, emotional and physical learning and well-being including, but not limited to: positive behavior programs and classes including art, music, physical education, early child-hood education, parenting skills, and juvenile justice reforms, while also increasing constructive family engagement with schools and the community and promote positive parental involvement across the state of Utah.

INDIVIDUAL DEVELOPMENT: Support programs and policies that promote constructive civic engagement and citizenship, positive character development, and strengthen individual students.

PENDING RESOLUTION

Resolutions are formal statements of Utah PTA public or association policy approved by the delegates at the annual Utah PTA Advocacy Conference or the annual National PTA and Utah PTA Conventions. These statements direct the advocacy work of Utah PTA. Documentation for the following resolutions can be found at utahpta.org/proposed-resolutions-0.

FAM 2024-1 | FAMILY ENGAGEMENT IN EDUCATION

- WHEREAS, Research has shown that a fundamental component of a student's academic success is parental engagement in the student's education and schools are partners in this "by investing in authentic relationships with families and honoring them as children's first teachers," and
- WHEREAS, When parents, educators and members of the community cooperate to encourage learning, research indicates children have higher outcomes and literacy rates; 24 and
- WHEREAS, The strongest predictors of parent engagement at school and at home are specific school programs that guide parents to help students succeed and teacher practices that encourage parent involvement in the education process which also improves teacher morale and higher rating and support of teachers by the community; 6 and
- WHEREAS, When parents are involved, students are more likely to exhibit positive attitudes toward school, higher levels of school attendance, and fewer disciplinary issues _{7.8,9} now, therefore, be it
- Resolved, That Utah PTA and its constituent associations actively seek or develop and promote programs that assist parents in extending and supporting skills developed at school; and be it further
- Resolved, That Utah PTA promote the use of programs and tools to guide parents, alongside their children, in forming plans for their children's education; and be it further
- Resolved, That Utah PTA and its constituent associations provide opportunities for parents to feel welcome and valued at their children's schools and to partner intentionally with teachers and other school personnel as well as create strong partnerships within the community; and be it further
- Resolved, that Utah PTA and its constituent associations support policies of the Utah State Board of Education and local school districts that result in practices that encourage purposeful parental engagement in education.
